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how does the historian approach memory and how do historians use different sources to analyze how history and memory interact and impact on each other memory and history explores the different aspects of the study of this field taking examples from europe australia the usa and japan and treating periods beyond living memory as well as the recent past the volume highlights the contours of the current vogue for memory among historians while demonstrating the diversity and imagination of the field each chapter looks at a set of key historical and historiographical questions through research based case studies how does engaging with memory as either source or subject help to illuminate the past what are the theoretical ethical and or methodological challenges that are encountered by historians engaging with memory in this way and how might they be managed how can the reading of a particular set of sources illuminate both of these questions the chapters cover a diverse range of approaches and subjects including oral history memorialization and commemoration visual cultures and photography autobiographical fiction material culture ethnic relations the individual and collective memories of war veterans the chapters collectively address a wide range of primary source material beyond oral testimony photography monuments memoir and autobiographical writing fiction art and woodcuttings everyday and exotic cultural artefacts journalism political polemic the law and witness testimony this book will be essential reading for students of history and memory providing an accessible guide to the historical study of memory through a focus on varied source materials

in recent years memory has become a central though also a controversial concept in historical studies a term that denotes both a new and distinctive field of study and a fresh way of conceptualizing history as a field of inquiry more generally this book which is aimed both at specialists and at students provides historians with an accessible and stimulating introduction to debates and theories about memory and to the range of approaches that have been taken to the study of it in history and other disciplines contributing in a wide ranging way to debate on some of the central conceptual problems of memory studies the book explores the relationships between the individual and the collective between memory as survival and memory as reconstruction between remembering as a subjective experience and as a social or cultural practice and between memory and history as modes of retrospective knowledge

a cultural history of memory in the nineteenth century comprises scholarly inquiry into representations of memory and historical cultures during the long nineteenth century in the era that invented photography revised the history of the earth and saw innovative communication and transportation technologies transform the experience of time and distance both

personal and collective memories were translated into new forms of expression material cultures of memory produced relics and souvenirs within institutions such as museums and archives dedicated to preservation while commemorative practices expanded within both the private sphere and the growing public sphere generating monuments and memorials while erasing other stories about the meaning of the past innovative writers and thinkers creatively engaged memory in ways which continue to shape psychology history and literature today in this volume thematic chapters survey representations of memory in power and politics remembering and forgetting time and space media and technology knowledge science and education high culture and popular culture philosophy religion and history and rituals and faith practices in everyday life

this is a masterful volume on remembrance and war in the twentieth century jay winter locates the fascination with the subject of memory within a long term trajectory that focuses on the great war images languages and practices that appeared during and after the two world wars focused on the need to acknowledge the victims of war and shaped the ways in which future conflicts were imagined and remembered at the core of the memory boom is an array of collective meditations on war and the victims of war winter says the book begins by tracing the origins of contemporary interest in memory then describes practices of remembrance that have linked history and memory particularly in the first half of the twentieth century the author also considers theaters of memory film television museums and war crimes trials in which the past is seen through public representations of memories the book concludes with reflections on the significance of these practices for the cultural history of the twentieth century as a whole

memory trauma and history is composed of essays that fall into five overlapping subject areas history and memory psychoanalysis and trauma postmodernism scholarship and cultural politics photography and representation and liberal education introduction

as nathan huggins once stated altering american history to account fully for the nation s black voices would change the tone and meaning the frame and the substance of the entire story rather than a sort of pilgrim s progress tale of bold ascent and triumph american history with the black parts told in full would be transmuted into an existential tragedy closer huggins said to sartre s no exit than to the vision of life in bunyan the relation between memory and history has received

increasing attention both from historians and from literary critics in this volume a group of leading scholars has come together to examine the role of historical consciousness and imagination in african american culture the result is a complex picture of the dynamic ways in which african american historical identity constantly invents and transmits itself in literature art oral documents and performances each of the scholars represented has chosen a different site of memory from a variety of historical and geographical points and from different ideological theoretical and artistic perspectives yet the book is unified by a common concern with the construction of an emerging african american cultural memory the renowned group of contributors including hazel carby werner sollors veve clark catherine clinton and nellie mckay among others consists of participants of the five year series of conferences at the dubois institute at harvard university from which this collection originated conducted under the leadership of genevieve fabre melvin dixon and the late nathan huggins the conferences and as a result this book represent something of a cultural moment themselves and scholars and students of american and african american literature and history will be richer as a result

dominick lacapra focuses on the interactions among history memory and ethicopolitical concerns as they emerge in the aftermath of the shoah particularly notable are his analyses of albert camus s novella the fall claude lanzmann s film shoah and art spiegelman s comic book maus lacapra also considers the historians debate in the aftermath of german reunification and the role of psychoanalysis in historical understanding and critical theory

discussing the relationship between the past and the present in irish society this 2001 title outlines the ways in which irish identities have been shaped by oral tradition icons and images rituals and re enactments it examines pivotal moments in irish history such as the 1798 rebellion the famine the great war and the northern ireland troubles investigating the ways in which they have been recalled commemorated and mythologised beginning with the conviction that commemoration has its own history the essays address questions concerning the workings of communal memory how have particular political and social groups interpreted appropriated and distorted the past for their own purposes how are collective memories transmitted from one generation to the next why does collective amnesia work in some situations and not in others what is the relationship between academic history and popular memory

effects of trauma upon memory with particular attention to the remembered legacy of the holocaust he follows with an analysis of the implications of this scholarship for our thinking about history itself with attention to such issues as the mnemonics of historical time and the encounter between representation and experience in historical understanding his book provides insight into the way interest in the concept of memory as opposed to long standing alternatives such as myth tradition and heritage has opened new vistas for scholarship not only in cultural history but also in shared ventures in memory studies in related fields in the humanities and social sciences

from history to theory describes major changes in the conceptual language of the humanities particularly in the discourse of history in seven beautifully written closely related essays kerwin lee klein traces the development of academic vocabularies through the dynamically shifting cultural political and linguistic landscapes of the twentieth century he considers the rise and fall of philosophy of history and discusses past attempts to imbue historical discourse with scientific precision he explores the development of the meta narrative and the post marxist view of history and shows how the present resurgence of old words such as memory in new contexts is providing a way to address marginalized peoples in analyzing linguistic changes in the north american academy from history to theory innovatively ties semantic shifts in academic discourse to key trends in american society culture and politics

how has understanding of memory evolved over the past 2 500 years how has our collective memory been influenced and expressed by politics culture philosophy and science in a work that spans over 2 500 years these ambitious questions are addressed by 64 experts each contributing their overview of a theme applied to a period in history the volumes situate our understanding of memory within a variety of historical contexts looking to art and science alike to determine how it has changed in western society since antiquity individual volume editors ensure the cohesion of the whole and to make it as easy as possible to use chapter titles are identical across each of the volumes this gives the choice of reading about a specific period in one of the volumes or following a theme across history by reading the relevant chapter in each of the six the six volumes cover 1 antiquity 800 bce 500 ce 2 middle ages 500 1450 3 early modern age 1450 1700 4 eighteenth century 1700 1800 5 nineteenth century 1800 1900 6 long twentieth century 1900 2000 themes and chapter titles are politics time and space media and technology science and education philosophy religion and history high culture and popular culture society remembering and forgetting the page extent is approximately 1 728 pp with c 300 illustrations
